### **High court tosses** \$3.4M award to child porn victim

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Supreme Court today said a federal law limits how much money victims of child pornography can recover from people who viewed their images online, throwing out a nearly \$3.4 million judgment in favor of a victim. Two dissenting justices called on Congress to change the law to benefit victims.

The justices said in a 5-4 ruling that courts can order people convicted of child pornography to pay restitution to their victims, but only to the extent that there is a strong tie between the victim's losses and the convicts' actions.

## **Board** fires Magnolia detective

The Magnolia Police Department's second-incommand, Capt. James Kenny, was relieved of his duties Tuesday after town aldermen voted unanimously to fire him.

The move comes a month after Kenny was convicted in Pike County Court on a misdemeanor charge of violating a domestic abuse protection or-

The board met at 5:30 p.m., continuing talks in executive session that were initiated earlier this month and recessed after aldermen failed to come to an agreement.

The second session, however, proved quick and decisive, as the board spent only about 30 minutes in closed session, then emerged with Alderman Lonnie Cox moving to terminate Kenny. Alderman Ioe Cornacchione seconded the motion.

It passed unanimously, though Mayor Melvin Harris was absent, prompting Alderman-at-large Mercedes Ricks to fill in as mayor pro tem.

Police Chief Reynolds accompanied the board into closed session, but Kenny did not attend the meeting at all.
